ABOUT YOU (to share with others while mingling):

You were hired to sell ale at Ye Olde Renaissance Faire. Although your uniform is vaguely medieval, your job is a lot like food service at a theme park. The best part is listening to the wild things people say when they're drinking—and then spreading some of the juicier bits around to your co-workers.

WHAT OTHERS DON'T KNOW ABOUT YOU (keep this secret)

You've been collecting gossip about the Green Knight for weeks, but still don't have enough to make him stop blackmailing you. He found out that you've been stealing kegs of ale and selling them on the side. He was going to tell Harda Snales, the Faire owner, unless you forked over half your paycheck.

INTRODUCE YOURSELF AT THE START OF THE GAME BY READING THIS:

I'm Pullamine Pint, and I work here serving ale. I do enjoy chatting with the other performers when they drop by after their shift—I've always loved hearing gossip, especially about that obnoxious Green Knight.

ROUND 1 QUESTIONING

When asked by another guest at the party, read the statement below, or improvise based on the information below.

ROUND 1 QUESTIONING ANSWER IF INNOCENT

ROUND 1 QUESTIONING ANSWER IF GUILTY

Just because he claimed me as a source of income doesn't mean that I was really paying him—I don't believe in paying blackmail! He was such a liar!

AFTER YOU HAVE READ YOUR ANSWER IT'S TIME TO ASK A QUESTION OF ANOTHER GUEST FROM THE QUESTION MENU.

ROUND 2 QUESTIONING

When asked by another guest at the party, read the statement below, or improvise based on the information below.

ROUND 2 QUESTIONING ANSWER IF INNOCENT

He noticed me selling a few kegs of ale that I er, "lifted" from my bar and demanded I give him half of my profit. He was about to lose that income, though—the business was getting too dangerous.

ROUND 2 QUESTIONING ANSWER IF GUILTY

He noticed me selling a few kegs of ale that I er, "lifted" from my bar and demanded I give him half of my profit. I was getting sick of him stealing my take, so I was trying to find ways to get free of him. Wouldn't you do the same thing? Doesn't mean I killed him.

ROUND 3 QUESTIONING

When asked by another guest at the party, read the statement below, or improvise based on the information below.

ROUND 3 QUESTIONING ANSWER IF INNOCENT

I wondered if it was him, but I decided he wouldn't risk his extra income by betraying me. If I thought he'd done it, I'd be furious!

ROUND 3 QUESTIONING ANSWER IF GUILTY

I wondered if he would risk his extra income by betraying me. It didn't seem like a good idea, but it might be just the thing to appeal to his nasty sense of humor!

AFTER YOU HAVE READ YOUR ANSWER IT'S TIME TO ASK A QUESTION OF ANOTHER GUEST FROM THE QUESTION MENU.

THE FINAL STATEMENTS

Based on the number on your Who Did It Slip, read your final statement below. If you are innocent, read the INNOCENT paragraph. If you are the murderer, Read the MURDERER paragraph.

AT THE END OF THE GAME READ THE FOLLOWING

If you're INNOCENT, read:

There's no way I would kill someone, even someone as obnoxious as the Green Knight, over a little money. There are so many bars I could go work at instead!

If you're THE MURDERER, read:

Yeah, I did it. I thought he had betrayed me to the police in spite of all the blackmail I had paid him, which was a lot. So I decided to kill him, and I thought that a jousting lance would be poetic justice for a crooked knight. I stole the Blue Squire's keys, found a good length of broken lance and sharpened it. Then I sneaked backstage when I knew he would be alone, and let him have it. I loved seeing the surprise on his face!
